As he grew in faith and understanding of God's love, Paul also became more aware of his own failings. Instead of taking pride in his life, he now saw how he failed to life up to God's demands of perfection. While he wanted to lead a perfect life for Christ, he found he couldn't. He couldn't shake off his sinful nature, which previously patted him on the back for his pride.

In faith, he wanted to be without sin, but he couldn't. As he said, the good he wanted to do just didn't happen, and the evil he didn't want to do, well, he did that. **(Romans 7:15-23)** Hence his proclamation and cry for help, and his recognition of the only source of help- God his Savior.

So it is for us. We recognize the work God has begun in us. When we fail, we turn to the one who has saved us. In him we find true comfort and reassurance of his love. Live in him, with him, for him.
