1. What was your favorite thing your mom/grandma did for your family? Why did she do it?

2. What was the condition of Peter's mother-in-law? How bad was it? How well does your house run with mom/grandma become ill? Why do you think that is?

3. Name a time when Jesus has healed you? What did he use to heal you?

4. In the sermon, what was the first reason Pastor gave why Jesus heals us? What is your usual answer when you answer the

question when you're ill: "Why do you want to get better?" Now, as a Christian, how can you answer that question?

5. What does verse 30 tell you about how Jesus felt about Peter's mother-in-law (name several reasons why you say that)? How does Jesus feel about you? What helps you remember that?

6. We often avoid pain. But, in the sermon, we learn that God can use pain for our good. How does he do that (name two ways)?

7. How did people know to bring their sick and hurting to Jesus' door? What did Jesus do about them? What does that tell you about the heart of Jesus?

8. How did Jesus give us ultimate healing? What difference does that make in our lives?

9. In verse 35, Jesus did something we probably wouldn't normally do. What did he do? Who did Pastor say he did this for? Why?

10. We are God's stewards or "managers" of the time he gives us. How will you use your time this week for God?
